1. The student develops concepts about self, human relationships, and the environment using elements of drama and conventions of theatre. The student is expected to: 6-8.2.1

- A. explore characterization using sensory and emotional recall; 6-8.2.1.A
- B. develop and apply theatre preparation and warm-up techniques; 6-8.2.1.B
- C. create expressive and rhythmic movements; 6-8.2.1.C
- D. develop an increased understanding of the mechanisms of vocal production; 6-8.2.1.D
- E. demonstrate knowledge of theatrical vocabulary and terminology; and 6-8.2.1.E
- F. analyze and evaluate the structure and form of dramatic literature. 6-8.2.1.F

2. The student interprets characters using the voice and body expressively and creates dramatizations. The student is expected to: 6-8.2.2

- A. demonstrate safe use of the voice and body; 6-8.2.2.A
- B. define characters by what they do, what they say, and what others say about them; 6-8.2.2.B
- C. select movements and dialogue to portray a character appropriately; 6-8.2.2.C
- D. create stories collaboratively and individually that have dramatic structure; 6-8.2.2.D
